

## The Queen's message: 'I thank you all from a full heart' LET US CHERISH OUR OWN WAY OF LIFE

The Queen, who spoke ringing and confident tones, broadcast this message to Britain and the Commonwealth at 9 o'clock last night after her Coronation:

**W**HEN I spoke to you last, at Christmas, I asked you all, whatever your religion, to pray for me on the day of my Coronation—to pray that God would give me wisdom and strength to carry out the promises that I should then be making.

Throughout this memorable day I have been upheld and sustained by the knowledge that your thoughts and prayers were with me. I have been aware all the time that my country, a proud, free and wise throughout every continent and ocean in the world, were united to support me in the task to which I have now been dedicated with such solemnity.

Many thousands of you came to London from all parts of the Commonwealth and Empire to join in the ceremony, but I have been conscious, too, of the millions of others who have shared in it by means of wireless or television in their homes. All of you, near or far, have been united in one purpose.

### My husband...

It is hard for me to find words in which to tell you of the strength which this knowledge has given me.

The ceremonies you have seen today are ancient, and some of their origins are rooted in the mists of the past. But their spirit and their meaning shine through the ages, never, perhaps, more brightly than now.

I have in solemnity pledged myself to your service, as so many of you are pledged to mine. Throughout all my life and with all my heart I shall strive to be worthy of your trust.

In this resolve I have my husband to support me. He shares all my ideas and all my affection for you. Then, although my experience is so short and my life is so new, I have in my parents and grandparents so complete which I can follow with certainty and with confidence.

### Our hopes...

There is also this. I have believed for long that the spirit of the old traditions and the thousand years but the living strength and majesty of the Commonwealth and Empire: of societies old and new; of lands and races different in history and religion but all, by God's will, united in spirit and in aim.

Therefore I am sure that this, my Coronation, is not the symbol of a power and a splendour that are mine but a declaration of our hopes for the future and for the years I may, by God's grace and mercy, be given to reign and serve you as your Queen.

I have been speaking of the vast regions and varied people to whom I owe my duty, but there has also sprung from our island some a flame of social and political thought which establishes our message to the world and through the changing generations has found acceptance both within and far beyond our realm.

### Your loyalty...

Participating institutions, with their free speech and respect for the rights of minorities, and the inspiration of a broad tolerance in thought and its expression—all this we consider to be a precious part of our way of life and culture.

During recent centuries this message has been sustained and invigorated by our common contribution, in language, literature, art and action, of the nations of our Commonwealth and Empire.

It gives expression, as I pray it always will, to living principles as sacred to the Crown and Ministry as to the many Parliaments and peoples. I ask you now to cherish them—and practise them too; that we may go forward together in peace, justice and freedom for all men.

As this day draws to its close, I know that the solemn ceremony of it will be not only the solemnity and beauty of the ceremony but the inspiration of your loyalty and affection.

I thank you all from a full heart. God bless you all.

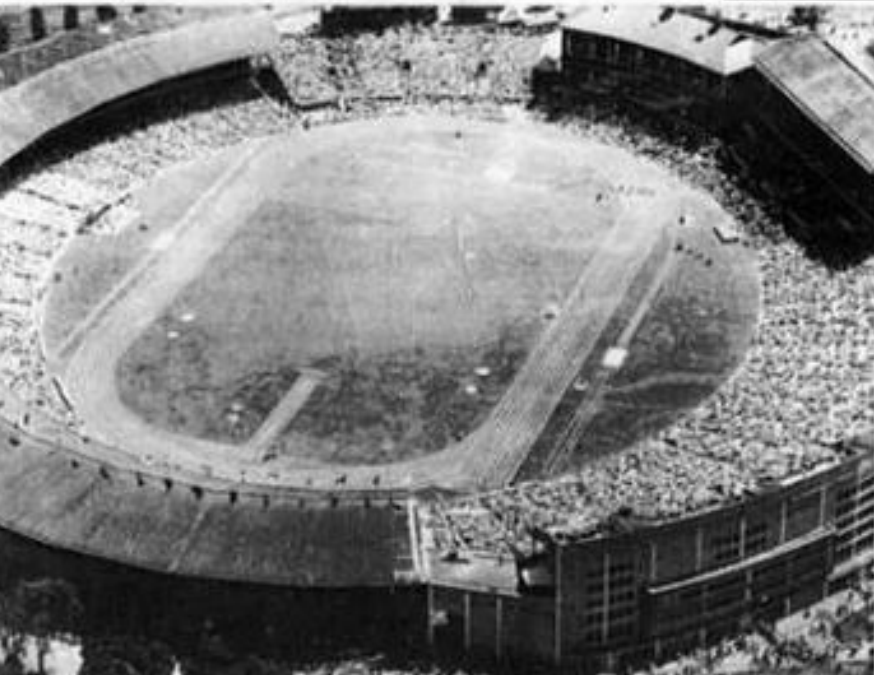

# how Elvis told his mom goodbye

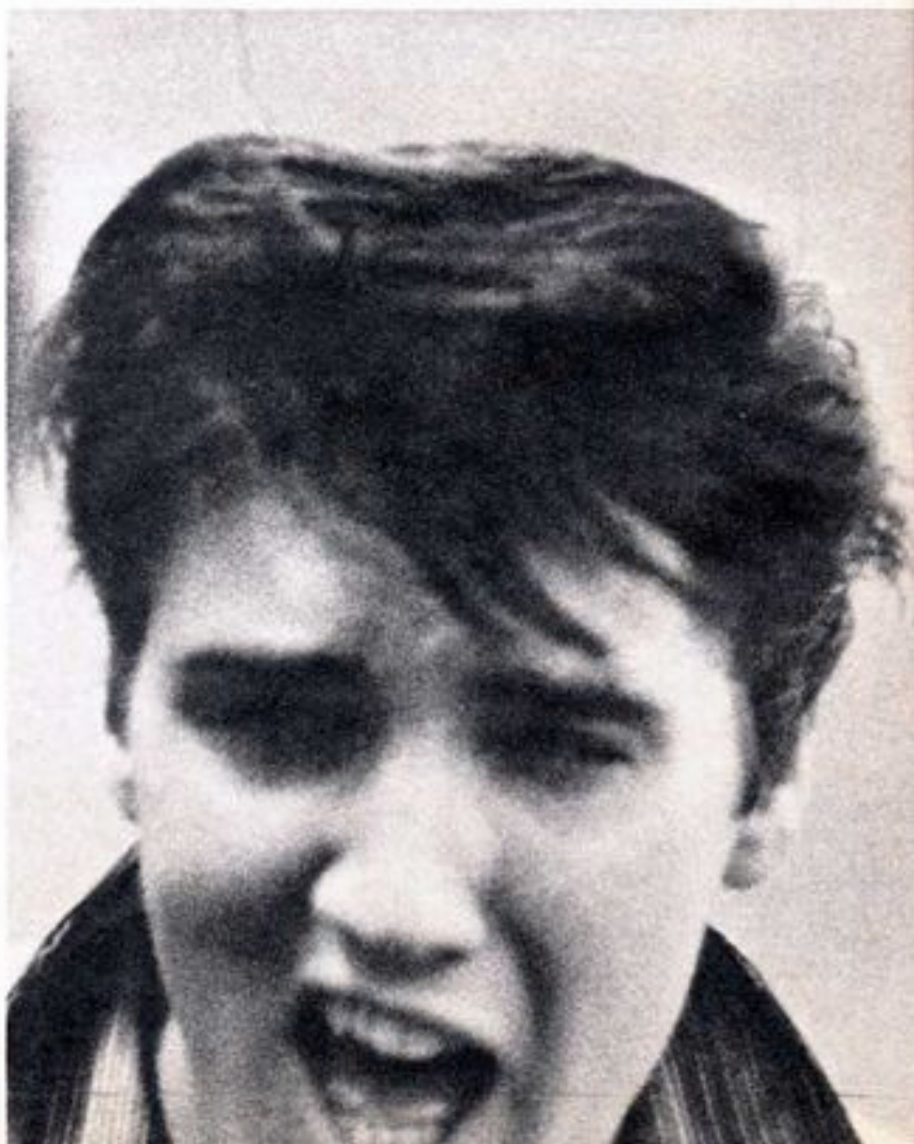

■ "Oh, God, everything I have is gone. Goodbye, darling, goodbye." The words were torn from Elvis Presley's tortured heart as the body of his beloved mother was slowly lowered into the grave in Memphis' Forest Hill Cemetery. It was the climax to a week of anguish and the boy who had wept so much found there were still more tears to shed, more tears there at the grave and more in the empty days that stretched ahead.

Elvis' week of anguish began on Friday evening, August 8, when he drove his mom and dad to the railroad station in Fort Worth. They'd been staying in a rented house in the little town of Sabine, near Fort Hood, ever since Elvis returned to camp in mid-June after his Memphis furlough. These had been happy times with Elvis home almost every night and on all week-ends. But Mrs. Presley had not been feeling well for several days and wanted to get back home and under the care of the doctor who had been treating her on and off for almost a year. She was feeling badly in the car and she felt worse on the train.

Arriving in Memphis shortly after noon on Saturday, the Presleys went directly to the doctor's office. Later that afternoon, Mrs. Presley was admitted to the Methodist Hospital and on the next day, her physician told reporters she was suffering from acute hepatitis but that an emergency leave for Elvis did not seem warranted at that time.

## Virginia's Schools Still Quiet

RICHMOND, Va., Feb. 3 (P)—Racially integrated classes opened uneventfully today in six public schools in Norfolk. They continued without incident 200 miles to the north in Arlington County.

An allusion to "the niggers" came from a cluster of white lads at one Norfolk high school. That was the nearest thing to an incident in either community as racial mixing got its first full-scale test in the classrooms. In an attempt to hold integration to a minimum and prevent its spreading through the whole state, plans for a long range program will be coming to a head in the next few weeks in the governor's office and the General Assembly.

No Way Found  
The Assembly couldn't find a way to halt integration entirely in a five-day special session which came to an end last night.

Again today police kept vigil at the Norfolk schools and at Stratford Junior High in Arlington, a well-to-do Washington suburb. But again it was a matter of humdrum performance, of preserving order against threats in which never developed.

## Poulson Oks Street Bonds

\$149 Million Issue Would Convert Crowded Roads Into Flowing Highways

Mayor Poulson today endorsed a proposal for a \$149 million bond issue to rebuild congested, non-free-way streets into "freely moving major secondary highways."

The mayor acted on the recommendation of a committee of top city officials, which held that:

"Unless something is done on a crash basis now, we are approaching a crisis. By 1970, we will have as many as 1,600,000 automobiles belonging to residents of the city."

The mayor said he would present the recommendation immediately to the City Council.

The total program will come to \$160 million, the committee said, but \$20 million will be allocated to the city in subvention funds.

Without bail, the gambling suspects face several months in jail awaiting trial.

The woman, Mrs. Rita Nathaniel, 35, of 2350 Coolidge Ave., West Los Angeles, probably will get her freedom today regardless of the judge's decision.

"Relatives in the east mortgaged their homes so we could get out," Runge said.

## Brown Says 'Austerity' Saving Due

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 3.

All state departments and agencies have gone on a rigid "austerity" program which may save \$5 million in the next five months, says Gov. Brown.

The governor told news men he asked every department head to report on steps which can be taken immediately to reduce state spending between now and June 30.

Brown said he has received reports indicating that "we will be able to save \$3 million" by the end of the current fiscal year.

Economy Items  
Most of the savings, he said, will be achieved by reducing travel, cutting purchases and leaving job vacancies unfilled.

## Reds Halt U.S. Convoy From Berlin

BERLIN, Feb. 3 (P)—The Russians today held a U.S. Army convoy of four cargo trucks and five soldiers on the East German autobahn within sight of the West German border. The convoy was en route from Berlin to West Germany.

Demand Declined

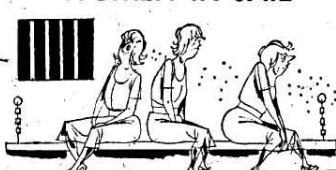

# SPACE RACE

## THE RUSSIANS PLAN TO GET THERE FIRST



THE SPACE RACE IS ON—AND THE RUSSIANS ARE RACING TO BE FIRST TO SEND A MAN-MADE SATELLITE HURTLING ROUND THE EARTH HUNDREDS OF MILES UP.

THEIR satellite will be launched within eighteen months, they announced yesterday. And it will be BIGGER than the football-sized satellite planned by America.

This breath-taking announcement of the race to enter space was made by Professor Leonid Brezhnev, chief of the Soviet Interplanetary Commission.

Only five days ago, America for the first time, rocketed the satellite Venera of space travel closer to reality by announcing S.S. 8000 for a globe-circling satellite.

With football-sized satellite, packed with scientific instruments, will hurtle round the earth at 18,000 miles an hour 100 miles up.

### A satellite 'bigger' than America's

They, too, will be launched within eighteen months of the rocket launch.

#### Rocket-powered

The size of S.S. 8000 is "rather large," said Professor Brezhnev yesterday. "It will be the size of the number of instruments it was designed to pack into it. Like America, it would be sent up to 100 miles."

Professor Brezhnev added: "To get the satellite up, that is the important thing."

He was speaking at Copenhagen, Denmark's capital where he is leading a Russian delegation to a conference of space-travel experts.
